RICHARD FALK

ALBERT G. MILBANK PROFESSOR EMERITUS OF INTERNATIONAL LAW, PRINCETON UNIVERSITY (1961-2001) AND, SINCE 2002, DISTINGUISHED VISITING PROFESSOR OF GLOBAL AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, SANTA BARBARA

Professor Falk has been the Special Rapporteur on Occupied Palestine for the United Nations Human Rights Council since 2008. He is also Chair of the Board, Nuclear Age Peace Foundation. In 2008-2009 he served as a senior advisor to the President of the United Nations General Assembly. He is an Honorary Editor of the American Journal of International Law. Over the years, Falk has published many books, including *Legal Order* in a Violent World (1968); This Endangered Planet: Prospects and Proposals for Human Survival (1971); A Study of Future Worlds (1975); Predatory Globalization: A Critique (1999); and Religion and Humane Global Governance (2001). His most recent book is Achieving Human Rights (2009).
